CFWEP has grown tremendously since the first pilot project in 2003, expanding beyond our watershed to reach the far-flung edges our state. Initially, the Natural Resource Damage Program charged us with ensuring that every citizen of the Clark Fork Watershed understood what happened here. Our goals included helping our students understand how Montana's citizens were going about creating change and restoring

That work continues, but we have expanded to look at other challenges, including climate change, community resiliency, biomedical innovations and human health. The thing that has not changed in the nearly 20 years of our work is that we aspire to create generations of people who will love and care for their local environments. We create meaningful experiences, utilizing the place-based practices that invite students to participate as scientists within their own backyards.


Early in our founding, we recognized that without teachers, our mission would be futile. We could reach a few thousand students each year with our direct service programming, however to make a lasting impact, we needed teachers at our side. To that end, we have uplifted and supported hundreds of teachers through direct service in classrooms and long-term professional development programs. In recent years, we created a pipeline program at Montana Tech that gives students an entry point to STEM. Such pipeline programs are the next step in our evolution as we have recognized that to truly fulfill our promise to create scientific literacy within communities, we will need a wider and diverse field of practicing scientists at our side.







For the past 17 years, roughly half of CFWEP's funding has come from the Natural Resource Damage Program (NRDP), the agency managing the Clark Fork Superfund dollars, with matching funds from state and federal grant and contract providers. As the last phase of the Clark Fork Watershed's restoration begins, we understand that sustaining our program will require in- creased private investment. In the last year, we began working towards the goal of diversifying our funding by investing time in growing our visibility, developing donor recognition plans, recruiting a volunteer Executive Leadership Team of local business leaders, and securing a capacity-building grant from the Dennis and Phyllis Washington Foundation.
